

Senator Tillman in the May State convention of 1896, at Columbia, in an impassioned speech advocated electing delegates to the National Democratic convention "pledged to free silver at 16 to 1 or bust"; delegates instructed to bolt the National convention unless it endorsed "16 to 1" The late Senator Irby opposed him in an elcquent speech appealing for party loyalty under all conditions.

In the recent convention not a syllable was uttered about "Free silver and sixteen to 1"-possibly because the "bust" part of the programme of 1896 was recognized as sufficiently carried out-but Senator Tillman reported a rule pledging congressional candidates not to bolt the party under any considerations, and the rule was adopted.

Thus after six years Senator Tillman becomes the disciple of Senator Irby, accepting the doctrine of party loyalty that Senator Irby taught and which Senator Tillman then used as a cudgel to drive Senator Irby out of

The Confederate Dead.


Washington, May 29 .- A bill passed the House today for the improvement and care of the Confederate mound, in Oakwood cemetery Chi-


