I is rep r ed that Dr. D. M Croswill plant 100 acres to tobacco this sesson as an experiment, and the re nort, as far as we have seen, has not been depied. Dr. Crosson belives that tobecco can be successfully cultivated in the soil of L-xing ton on a paying banks, and has arrived at this conclusion after a thoughtful study of the subject in all the conditions required to the growth, nurture and development of the plant He has given evidence of his faith in the correctness of his theory by his works and is preparing to give the experiment a thorough, careful and an intelligent test. Dr Crosson is a hve and progressive farmer and we are truly glad that be has undertak en this important work, as he has the means at his command to carry on the work so as to obtain the best zeenlts. Perhaps the burden could not have fallen on the shoulders of a more competent and intelligent citi zen then he is, and one who will give the experiment more care and attention than be will so as to demonstrate beyond a doubt the adapt-bi lity of our soil to the cultivation of a fine grade of the weed at remunerative prices. The raising of tobacco above the cost of production means much to the financial interest of Lexington county. It is a money crop and places at the disposal of the farmers the ready cash at a time when it is mostly needed and will enable them to harvest their other crops without being forced to go into debt to do so The result of Dr. Crosson's experiment in the cultivation of the weed will be carefully watched with deep interest by the farmers of Lexington, as well as many

There are other large planters in and around Leesville, as well as in other sections of that vicinity, whose names we have failed to learn, who joined Dr. Crosson in his undertak ing, and it is certain that through, the influence of this large combination of brains and capital the experiment will be given a thorough and an intelligent trial.
