Pensioners Take Notice.

The Pension Commissioner will be in the Auditor's office on each Saturday in the month of January, 1904, to give out pension blanks. All applicants for pensions must meet him on these days, as no blanks will be given out only by the Commissioner. The representatives of each township will see that all blanks are properly filled and sent to the Commissioner all names of those who have died or moved out of the county since the last pension roll was made. And also send the names of those who are on the roll and in their judgment are not entitled to a pension.

The Pension Board will meet at Lexington Court House on the first Monday in February to revise and canvass said roll. Old pensioners need not appear before the Board. All new applicants must meet the Board on the first Monday in January, 1904.
