The smallpox patients are being released and the quarantine has been raised against them. No new case has developed, and the health officer will soon have nothing to do.

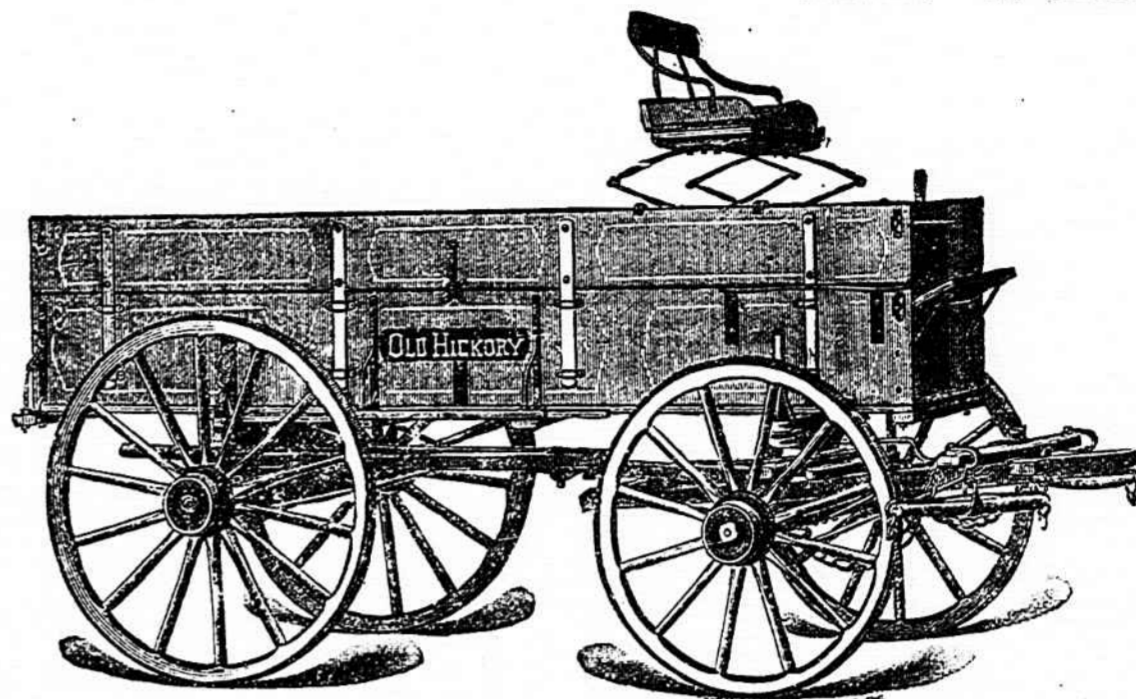
Mr. Will D. George, wife and children, have been on a visit to Mr. George's home people. He holds a good position with the Laurens cotton mill and left for there today.
