Live Stock Association.

The annual meeting of the Live Stock Association was called to order in the Y. M. C. A. hall in Columbia on the 8:h inst., by the president, Mr. B. Harris, of Pendleton. There were present about 50 intelligent and progressive farmers and live stock men from all sections of the State, and while the convention was not as largely attended as some are, it made up in intelligence and enthusiasm what was lacking in numbers Such an organization as this can do very much to spread the gospel of live stock in a small State, and the mem bers will return to their homes with new ideas and new resolutions, the benefit of which will go to their neighbors as well as to themselves.

President Harris report was short but full of good suggestions and encouragement, showing that the o: ganization is growing and calling attention to the benefits that have been accomplished so far.

Secretary Rawl in his report sug gested that a special committee of three be appointed to investigate the conditions and submit a plan by which sub-organization can be form ed in different sections of the State where they are needed, the idea being to reach all of the people of the State who are interested in the subject of cattle raising or ought to be interested.


