Live Stock Association.

The annual meeting of the Live Stock Association was called to order in the Y. M. C. A. hall in Columbia on the 8th inst., by the president, Mr. B. Harris, of Pendleton. There were present about 50 intelligent and progressive farmers and live stock men from all sections of the State, and while the convention was not as largely attended as some are, it made up in intelligence and enthusiasm what was lacking in numbers. Such an organization as this can do very much to spread the gospel of live stock in a small State, and the members will return to their homes with new ideas and new resolutions, the benefit of which will go to their neighbors as well as to themselves.

President Harris' report was short but full of good suggestions and encouragement, showing that the organization is growing and calling attention to the benefits that have been accomplished so far.

Secretary Rawl in his report suggested that a special committee of three be appointed to investigate the conditions and submit a plan by which sub-organization can be formed in different sections of the State where they are needed, the idea being to reach all of the people of the State who are interested in the subject of cattle raising or ought to be interested.

The officers of the association were re-elected as follows: President, B. Harris; Vice presidents in charge of departments: Horses and mules, D. F. Efrd, Lexington; dairy cattle, John G. Mobley, Wimsboro; beef cattle, T. J. Kinard, Ninety-Six; sheep and goats, M. R. Spigeeer, Columbia; swine, J. E. Heise, Columbia; poultry, T. E. F. Holzbouser, Columbia; manufacturers, C. G. Voigt, Esley.

Charged With Giving Poison.

Jackson, Miss., Feb 8.—Advice from Woodville states that the Wilkinson county grand jury has returned an indictment against Mrs. W. C. Stewart, on the charge of poisoning her husband, the alleged motive of the crime being she held a \$10,000

life insurance policy on the life of her husband. The indictment alleges that Mrs. Stewart administered morphine to her husband in large quantities, with the felonious intent of killing him, and it was only through the prompt action of other members of the Stewart family in sending for physicians that his life was saved.

Mrs. Stewart is a relative of Hon. M. H. Wilkinson, circuit judge of the district, who empaneled the grand jury that returned the indictment. Gov. Vardaman will appoint a special judge to preside at the trial of the woman, which will probably take place next week.

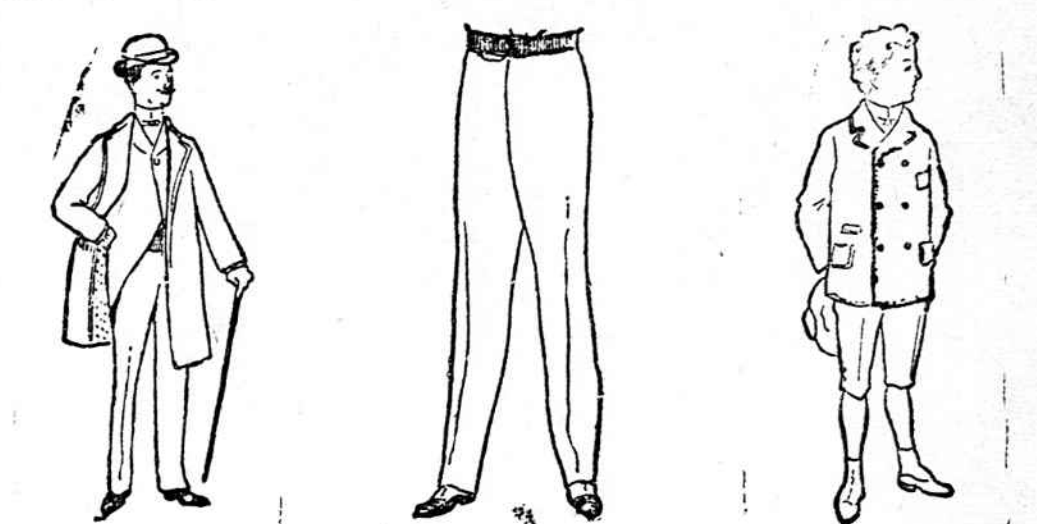
