Ellore Dispensary Closed.

Pursuant to the order of the county board of control a few days ago the Ellore dispensary closed its doors Tuesday April 30. There was \$125.25 unsold stock on hand, and this is at the disposal of the board. On February 16, when all the dispensaries were temporarily closed under the new law, there was about \$700 worth of stock on hand. When the dispensary was opened under the present law a carload of whiskey was shipped here and the first named figures is what remained of the old supply and the shipment when Dispenser Weeks checked up to day. The Dispensary has been in operation here a little over thirteen years, and Mr. J. M. Weeks has served continuously as dispenser during that time. He has made a capable and efficient official, enforcing the law without fear or favor. He retires from his position with the respect and confidence of the people. There has been a long and continuous fight here for prohibition and there are many who believe that the above action is for the best. The opportunity for the practice of prohibition now presents itself.
