The controversy between the tobacco growers and buyers in Kentucky is growing serious and trouble is expected.

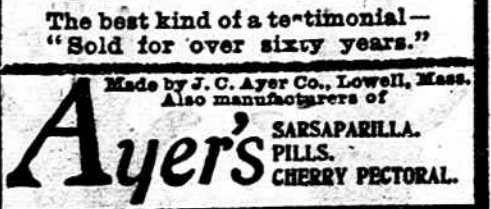
