During the year there has been three criminal courts held here, each a full week, and no longer for the reason that only one week is allowed

The gamblers stand at the head of the list with convictions in seventeen cases, and no acquittals. Assault and battery with intent to kill is next, with six convictions and acquittals. There were three cases for carrying pistols and all convicted; one conviction for violation dispensary law; one forgery and one for housebreaking and larceny.


