Mr. Campbell Here.

The entire community of Arthur's station was shocked on Sunday when the announcement was made that Mr. Willie D. Shull, one of the best citizens of that section, had died quiet suddenly. Mr. Shull had been complaining for a few days, but nothing of a serious nature was anticipated by his family and his sudden demise was a severe shock to them.

Mr. Shull was a good citizen, devoted father and Christian neighbor. He leaves a wife and eleven children to mourn his death.

The remains were interred in St. David's churchyard on Monday in the presence of a large congregation. The last sad rites were performed by his pastor, Rev. R. E. Livingston.

J. Kinsler Davis is Dead.

Mr. J. Kinsler Davis, one of the best known men of Richland and Lexington counties, died Thursday and was buried yesterday at Bakersville, in the family burying ground, the services having been conducted by Rev. Mr. Manly of Fort Motte.

Mr. Davis has been in failing health for some time. He was unable to be present last Monday at the State capitol to receive in person his bronze cross of honor in commemoration of his services as a Confederate soldier, but the cross was received by a friend and was given to the gallant veteran in his dying hours.

Mr. Davis was a son of Col. Tom Davis, a prominent figure in this county in ante-bellum days. As a student at the South Carolina college Kinsler Davis volunteered for the Confederate service. At the end of six months in Gregg's First South Carolina, that regiment being organized, Kinsler Davis returned to college just long enough to get his diploma.

He then returned to Confederate service, and was sergeant in command of Smith's couriers. He was one of the first men wounded in the entire war, this having been in the fighting around Charleston while he was a member of Col. Alex Taylor's company.

After the war Mr. Davis settled upon his farm in Lexington county. That he was a man beloved and honored is evidenced in the fact that he was elected to the legislature by 2,600 out of 3,000 votes. He married Miss Sallie Kaigler of Lexington county and is survived by the following children: T. R. Davis, Geo. K. Davis, Mrs. T. M. Nelson, Wm. K. Davis, Mrs. Skottowe Bellinger, Ed. H. Davis and Carolus F. Davis. One daughter died, Mrs. J. B. Beckham.

Mr. Davis was regarded as a man of the highest integrity, a man whose life was just what it should have been.—The State, 25th.
