Don't Burn Money.

As soon as the season opens up, do not go out and commence to burn off the vegetable matter on your fields. Our soil needs humus, and it is a mistake to burn grass, corn stalks or cotton stalks. If you are able, buy a stalk cutter and cut them up, so they will not be in the way of the plow or the growing crop. If you do not feel able to purchase a stalk cutter, take hoes or sticks and break the stalks to pieces. Many farmers think when they go out some windy day in the spring and set fire to all the stubble and stalks on their farm, that they are doing something—and in fact they are, burning up money—for any ton of stubble is worth \$5 to the soil as manure, while the ash from this stubble would not weigh over 80 pounds and not be worth exceeding fifty cents.—Southern Cultivator.

"Some time ago the department informed Mr. Lever that the new service would be started, but it has been impossible up to this time to get the necessary postal cars from the railroad company. All the towns between Columbia and Augusta will profit by the new arrangement."
