Decision in Railroad Case.

The supreme court on Thursday affirmed the decision of the circuit court in the case of J. M. Thompson, administrator for the estate of Chas. A. Thompson, against the Seaboard Air Line railway. Chas. A. Thompson was killed a few miles from Columbia on the Two-Notch road in October, 1905. In attempting to cross a bridge on the road one night in that month his mules drew the wagon over the side and as the Florida express approached Thompson ran up the track in the effort to stop the train. He was struck and fatally injured by the engine, which passed on and killed the mules and demolished the wagon. Suit was brought for \$10,000 and the jury in the case, which was tried in this county, returned a verdict of \$3,000. From this the attorneys for the railroad appealed on the ground of contributory negligence, the admission of certain evidence and on certain language used in the charge of the presiding judge. The decision of the circuit court was sustained, however, and the verdict of the higher court will stand.
