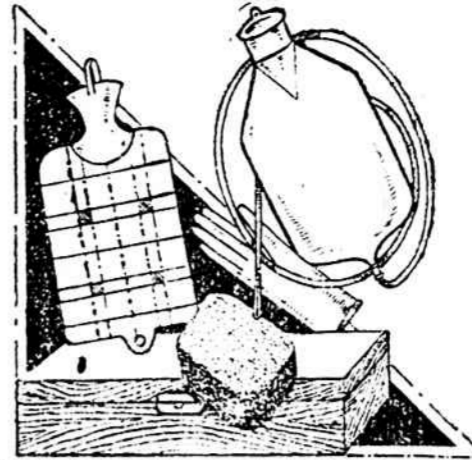
Equity Court.

Measles have about stopped raging in this community.

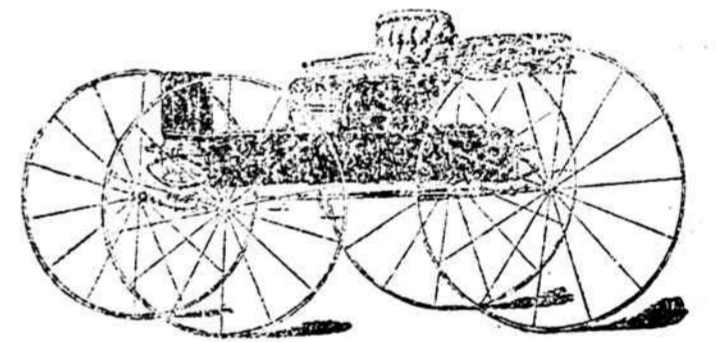

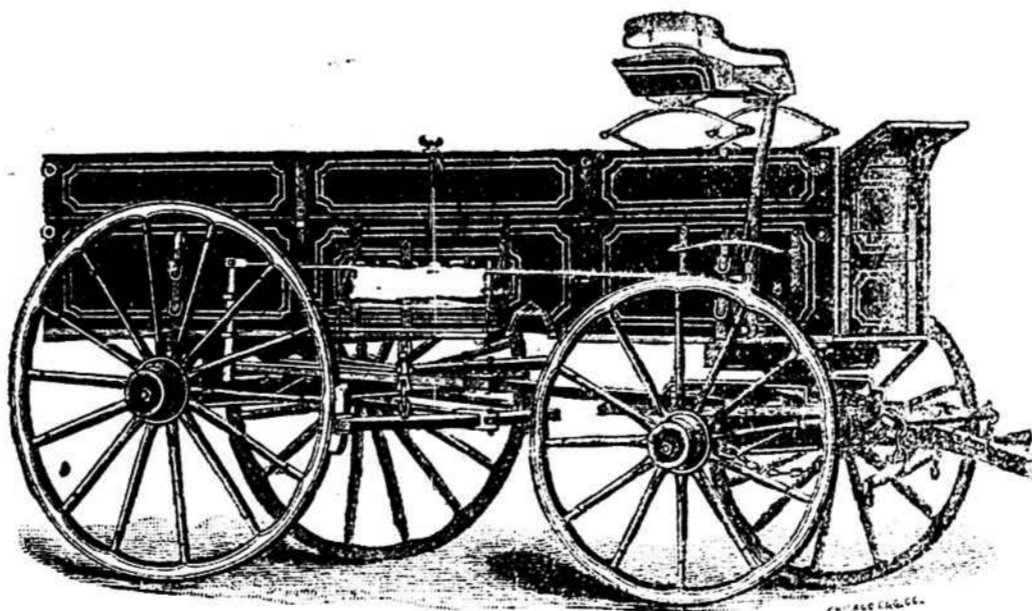
