THE STATE WINS IN DISPENSARY CASE.

Highest Tribunal Sustains Dispensary Commission-Alleged Grafters Now Likely to Be Tried.

Washington, April 5.-The supreme court today decided the dispensary case in favor of the State.

The federal receivers appointed by Judge Pritchard are removed and the State dispensary commission is restored to control of the funds of the dispensary. The decision read by Mr. Justice White, reasons that claims against the commission are claims against the State, which cannot be prosecuted under the constitution.

It is said that the commission will again take up the work where it was left off, and that Attorney General Lyon will now likely bring the alleged grafters to trial.
