Five Prisoners Captured.

Sheriff P. H. Corley and Deputy Sheriff Sim J. The negroes were first indicted for trespass on the lands of Col. J. H. Frick, and when, on the 11th, Constable L. L. Roof and Pierce Shealy attempted to make the arrest, the negroes resisted and run the officers out of the field with shotguns, hoes, and other instruments of warfare. The matter was reported to the officers here and on Monday the Sheriff and his deputy made the arrest. Eliza Eleazer and Lillie Eleazer were found at home, Sheriff Corley brought them to Lexington, leaving Deputy Sheriff Miller to get the other trio. Mr. Miller was successful after a wild and exciting chase and all of the defendants are now behind the bars.
