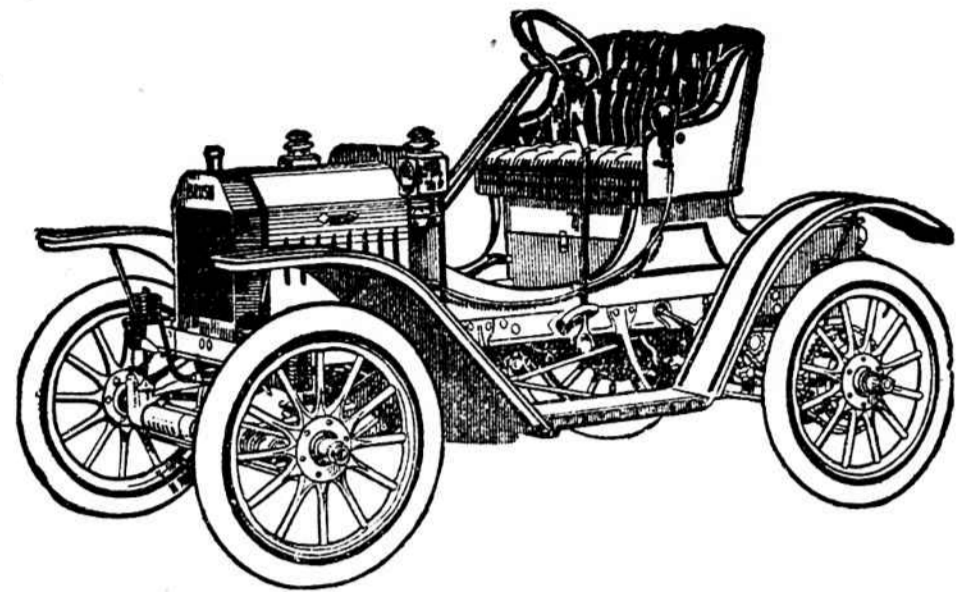

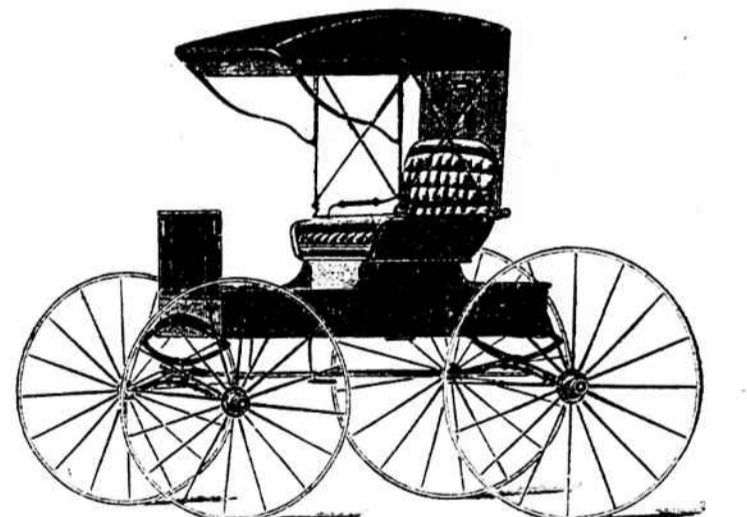

Mule's Peculiar Death.

Branchville, Aug. 22.—Last Tuesday morning Mr. J. A. Jones, who lives in the country about eight miles from here lost one of his best farm mules. Mr. Jones drove the mule to his field, where he was gathering some fodder, and, as usual, he tied a rope around the mule's neck and then tied the rope to a small tree. Then he went on to his work and did not think that the mule could get hurt. Sometime after Mr. Jones returned and found that the mule had pawed a deep hole at the root of the little tree at which he was hitched and that caused the tree to fall and when the tree fell it drew the rope by which the mule's nose was against the ground and prevented the mule from breathing. The mule was valued at about \$200.
