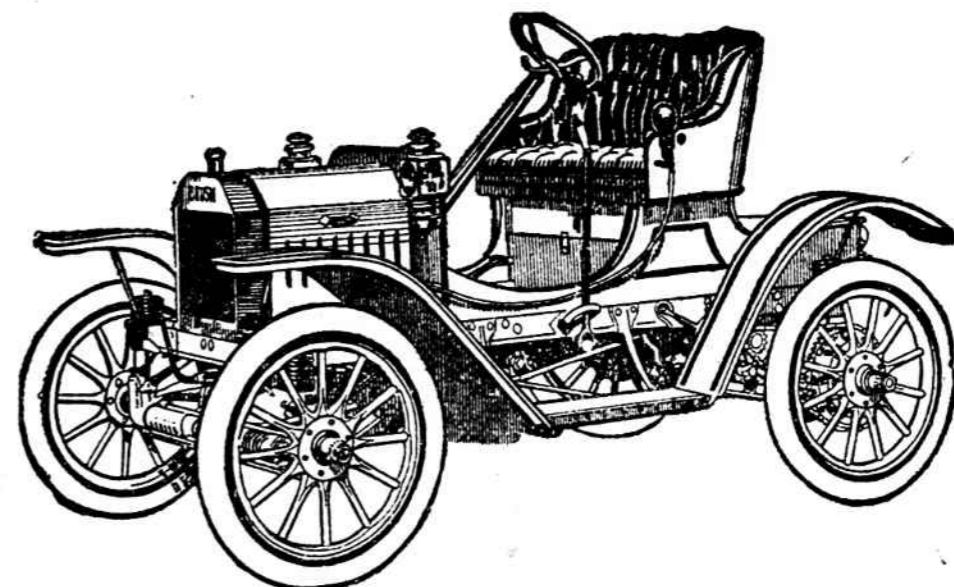
The examination will begin at 9 o'clock a. m. and all applicants should be here at that time.
