Ross Boozer Accidentally Killed by Brother.

One of the most unfortunate tragedies that has ever occurred in this county happened on Saturday afternoon, when Ross Boozer, a young white man, was accidentally shot and killed by his younger brother, Daly Boozer, at the home of the former about ten miles from Lexington.

Coroner Clarke held an inquest over the body on Sunday morning and the jury returned a verdict of accidental killing. There were only two witnesses to the tragedy—the wife of the unfortunate man killed and Daly Boozer. Each swore that Ross Boozer was lying on the floor picking peanuts; Daly Boozer was trying to remove a shell from the gun, when it was discharged, the entire load taking effect in the mouth of Ross Boozer, ranging downward through the heart.

Ross Boozer was buried on Sunday afternoon at St. Thomas' church in the Fork.

The deceased was about 23 years of age and the son of Mr. Henry Boozer, of Saxe-Gotha. Besides his parents, he leaves a wife and several brothers and sisters.

ATTEMPTED ASSAULT.

Coot Lever, Would-be Rapist, Saved From Mob by Deputy Sheriff Sim J. Miller.

On Monday afternoon Coot Lever, a negro, attempted to commit criminal assault upon the young wife of a prominent farmer of the Piney Woods section of the Dutch Fork. Fortunately the woman's cries were heard by her husband, who was plowing in a field nearby, and the negro fled without accomplishing his fiendish purpose.

The woman is said to have been severely choked, the finger nails of the brute penetrating the skin and causing the blood to flow.

The news of the attack spread like wild fire in a sage field and the entire settlement was soon in an uproar. The sheriff was notified and Deputy Sheriff Miller was dispatched to the scene at once in an automobile. Mr. Miller was not long working on the case before he had his man cornered in a negro house near Chapin. When approached Lever bitterly denied his guilt, but upon being told that he would have to be carried before the woman for identification, he confessed and told the whole story.

It was the intention of the officer at first to bring his prisoner by rail, but before the train arrived a posse road up on horseback and Mr. Miller spirited the prisoner to a place of safety and secured a horse and buggy and made for the jail at a lively gait, arriving here just ahead of a crowd on horseback.

At 12:30 yesterday a crowd of about 100 of the sturdy citizens of the Piney Woods section drove up to the jail gate for the purpose of securing the negro, but unfortunately for them and fortunately for the negro, Deputy Sheriff Miller had left just 30 minutes before for Columbia with Lever. The trip was made in 55 minutes.

The crowd was sober, but more the less determined, and took their defeat good naturedly.

Mr. Miller is receiving the congratulations of his friends upon his successful efforts in upholding the law.
