The old board will serve to pass upon all applications, after which date no blanks will be given out. The old representatives will serve for 1910, and will send to commissioner the names of all pensioners who have died or moved out of the county since last pension roll was paid off. Also the names of those on roll who should not receive pensions, with facts to satisfy board.

Jacob Corley Dead.

Mr. Jacob Corley, one of the oldest residents of this place, died at his home near the depot on Saturday morning at 3 o'clock. He has been in failing health for several weeks, but he died suddenly, heart trouble being assigned as the immediate cause.

Mr. Corley was a lifelong resident of Lexington. He was nearly 80 years of age and is survived by two brothers and three sisters. He was buried in the family burying ground on Sunday afternoon with services by the Rev. T. S. Brown, pastor of St. Stephen's Lutheran church, of which the deceased was a member. He was never married.
