## Carolina Boy May Win Corn Contest National Prize

A. Bascomb Usher, the Marlboro  
county boy who produced 152 1/2 bush-  
els of corn on one acre of land, was  
awarded the first prize for South Car-  
olina in the National Boys' Corn Con-  
test, which is held under the auspices  
of the Federal Farm Demonstration  
Office. He will spend this week in  
Washington as the guest of the govern-  
ment.

The state contest has not as yet been  
decided, and he will in all probability  
win this as there has been no greater  
yield reported to the commissioners.  
Mr. Usher has also won the first prize  
for Marlboro county.

Farm demonstration workers are of  
the opinion that Mr. Usher will win  
the first prize in the National contest  
as no greater yield has been reported  
for the season.

The champion corn producer of the  
state is only 17 years of age and the  
methods he used in producing the  
phenomenal yield proves very interest-  
ing.

## Money is Elected Minority Leader

Washington, D. C.—In caucus Thurs-  
day the Democratic senators elected  
Senator H. D. Money, of Mississippi  
as minority leader of the senate to  
succeed Senator Culberson, of Texas,  
whose resignation was presented.

Senator Bacon, of Georgia, had been  
mentioned very prominently for the  
chairmanship of the caucus, but would  
not consent to be a candidate in any  
sense if it involved a contest with  
Senator Money. Senator Bacon had  
been approached with an offer of the  
chairmanship when it was understood  
by some of the leaders that Senator  
Money, on account of recent ill-health  
might not be a candidate. The senator  
from Georgia replied that should such  
circumstances develop he would con-  
sent to be a candidate and not other-  
wise.

Senator Money who is now serving  
the last year of his term, and has been  
in the senate twelve years, and was vice-  
chairman of the caucus when Senator  
Culberson resigned.

Senator Shively, of Indiana, was  
elected vice-chairman.

because it gives a relish to the cold  
porridge of poverty. It is like pepper;  
because it is warming to the inwards,  
and sometimes brings tears to the eyes.  
It is like sugar; because it is sweet,  
and dealt out by spoonful at the table.  
It is like wine; because it makes us  
happy, and talk nonsense enough  
to physic, a cast iron phoenix. It is  
like a ship; because it rides upon both  
calm and troubled seas, and takes one  
to the wished-for port. It is like a  
jack-o-lantern; because it leads one  
into a bog, and the more a body strug-  
gles to get out, the deeper he is in the  
 mire. It is like the bite of a mad  
dog, or the kiss of a pretty woman;  
because the both makes a man run  
mad.

My friends—love, among other  
things, is like a rose tree; because it  
hath both thorns and blossoms. The  
blossoms are fragrant and beautiful,  
and the thorns are sharp and pierc-  
ing. It blooms for a short season, and  
then is lovely no more. Soon the  
green leaf of friendship turn yellow  
and fall; and there stands the unsight-  
ly tree of love, as barren of beauty as  
a flying fish is of feathers! It is like  
small-pox; because those who have  
once been afflicted with it are not li-  
able to have it again, except in a mild-  
er form. It is like the measles; be-  
cause it is severer with adults than  
with children. It is like the rain; be-  
cause it falls "upon the just and un-  
just." Like death; because it is no re-  
specter of persons. Like a shadow,  
because it sticks close to its object.  
Like a tick upon a sheep; because it  
cannot be shaken off. Like a wife;  
because there is no getting rid of it.  
Like a goose; because it is silly. Like  
a rabbit; because there is nothing like  
it. Like a monkey; because it makes  
mischief. In short, love is like a  
ghost; because it is like everything  
and like nothing—often talked about,  
but never seen, touched or under-  
stood. My hearers—Love, by some  
writer of old, has been mentioned as a  
strange compeer of war; for while  
war is slaying thousands with its  
swords, love is committing murder  
upon as many with its cruel darts.  
The former sheds blood enough in the  
course of a century to deluge a small  
township, and the latter causes tears  
to flow, in the same space of time,  
sufficient to keep a saw mill in opera-  
tion for a month of Sundays. The  
tears shed by repentance, compared  
with the quantity spilt by love, are  
about as a gentle fall of dew to a rain  
tempest in August.

But my friends there is a species of  
love that acts as oil upon the troubled  
waters—that lulls raging passion to  
rest—that smooths down the porcu-  
pine quills of envy, jealousy and re-  
venge—that causes the gory battle  
field to bloom with the unfading flow-  
ers of universal friendship—that glows  
like a beautiful rainbow upon the  
departing elements of strife—that  
comes like a white-winged angel from  
Heaven, proclaiming peace and "good  
will to men," and kissing its hand to  
the women, God bless them! This is  
the kind of love that I want to see  
more extensively propagated. Let  
the whole world be illuminated with  
its glorious effulgence, and sorrow  
will have to look some where else to  
deposit her gloom. Love one another,  
my friends; love everybody—  
white, black, brown, yellow and all—  
and the garden of humanity, now so  
overgrown with brambles and the vil-  
est of weeds, will soon be transformed  
into a paradise depicting the beauties
