SPECIAL MASTER'S SALE.

By virtue of a decree of the Court of Common Pleas for Lexington County, South Carolina, in the case of Citizens Bank of Batesburg against N. W. Brooker and others, dated December 3rd, 1909, I, John J. Earle, Special Master, will sell on Saturday, February 19th, being the 7th day of said month, during the usual hours of sale, before the Court House in the town of Lexington, County and State aforesaid, to the highest bidder:
