**Wounded At Altar Bridgroom
Kills Father Of Bride.**

Houston, Texas, March 18.—As the
priest was about to complete the cer-
emony that would have made the
daughter of Stephen Pace the wife of
Salvatore Guiffre, Pace broke into the
church and shot at Guiffre three
times. The third bullet wounded
Guiffre and, lying at the foot of the
altar, he raised a gun and inflicted a
wound on Pace from which he died
three hours later in a hospital.

The spectacular attack threw the
wedding guests into an uproar. Partis-
ans of both men were about to en-
gage in battle, knives flashed and guns
were drawn, when the cool-headed
priest and the plucky girl, who was
almost a bride, raised their voices.
The priest sprang to the chancel rail
and chastised the crowd that had
become a mob. Instantly the tumult
died down.

With blood flowing from his wounds,
Guiffre took the vow that made the
daughter of his victim his wife.
The father-in-law died early today
in a hospital.
