The County Convention.

The Lexington County Democratic convention was held in the court house on Monday with nearly every precinct in the county represented. County Chairman D. F. Efrd, in a ringing speech, announced the purpose of the meeting, its duties, etc. Upon motion of Col. E. L. Asbill, of Leesville, the Hon. W. H. Sharpe was elected temporary president. Upon taking the chair Mr. Sharpe thanked the convention for the honor conferred upon him. For more than twenty-five consecutive years Mr. Sharpe has been identified with the interest of the county in political affairs. He has held various offices and has served a number of terms in the house and in the senate. State Senator Crosson was elected temporary vice-president; James B. Addy temporary secretary; L. W. Wise temporary assistant secretary, and Capt. John G. Guignard treasurer. All of these officers were subsequently made permanent. Upon motion of Dr. R. H. Timmerman, of Batesburg, the Hon. D. Frank Efrd was unanimously elected county chairman, a position he has filled for the past two years with conspicuous ability.

Hon. George Bell Timmerman nominated Col. D. J. Griffith for re-election as a member of the State executive committee. The mention of Col. Griffith's name brought forth a storm of applause from the convention. The genial Col., as he rose to respond, was visibly affected and feelingly did he thank the people of his home county for the continued confidence reposed in him. Col. Griffith although a resident of Columbia now, being superintendent of the state penitentiary, still belongs to the old Lewiedale democratic club and never fails to attend its meetings. There is no more popular gentleman in the county today than D. J. Griffith.
