

Frank Rikard Met a Tragic Death.

Late Thursday afternoon, Frank Rikard, a young white man residing about one mile south of Edmunds, met a most tragic death. The young lad had worked hard all day and late in the afternoon walked down to the pond, which is located a short distance from the house, to spend some time fishing, taking his snotgun with him. He had not been gone long when his mother's attention was attracted by the report of a gun. She and a younger son hurried to the scene. Upon arrival at the pond they were horrified to find the young man lying flat in the boat gasping for life, with a ghastly wound in the stomach. He expired within a few minutes

without making a statement. It is the presumption that the young man, in getting into the boat. slipped and in falling the hammer of the gun struck the edge of the boat, causing a discharge of the shell.

Frank Rikard was only about 22 years of age, and was the mainstay of a widowed mother, his father having died some time ago.

His remains were laid to rest in the Shealy burying ground on Saturday morning at 10 o'clock in the presence of a large concourse of sorrowing relatives and friends.

Bridge Contract Awarded.

The County Board of Commissioners on Saturday awarded the contract for the construction of the steel bridge across Saluda at Wyse's Ferry, to the Carolina Engineering Company, of Burlington, N. C., for \$11,980. There were five companies represented, all making a bid, but the Carolina Engineering Co., were the lowest bidders, and the only one that came within the amount provided by the last legislature, \$12,000. This is the same company who secured the contract before and the fict that they have a considerable part of the material already on the ground, enabled them to underbid their competitors, it is said. At any rate, by the holding up of the workstast year, the county has been saved something over \$6,000 on the contract, the amount of the former contract, being \$18,500.


