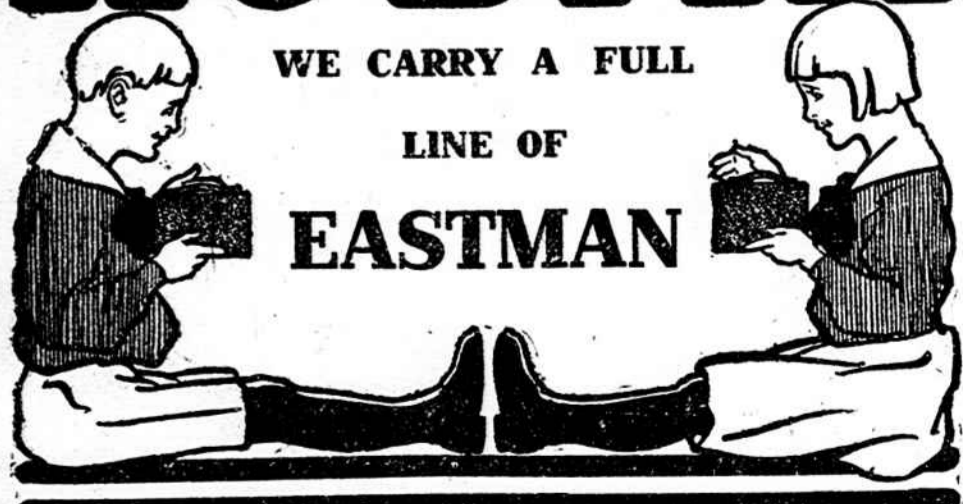

State Farmers' Union, will be at Gaston, in Platt Springs township, in this county, on Wednesday, Dec. 14, 1910, at 7 p. m. for the purpose of meeting the farmers of that community. The object of the meeting will be to organize a Local Union. All who are interested in this work are invited to be present.

Forged a Money Order.

Arthur Banks, a negro boy, better known in colored society circles as "Swansea," says he is going to take a post-graduate course in Sing Sing. On Saturday afternoon "Swansea" forged the name of Ed. White, one of the circus negroes who was sent to the chaingang last week, to a \$20 money order and secured the money at the Lexington postoffice.

Postmaster Leaphart was not in at the time and Assistant Postmaster Corley suspected nothing wrong. How "Swansea" came into possession of the money order is not known, but it is supposed that he got the letter from the postoffice and failed to deliver it to White. The money order was sent by the negro's relatives in Durham, N. C., and was dated November 14. With consummate cunning "Swansea" held onto the money order until after White had been convicted and sent to the gang before he made an effort to get the money.

As soon as the forgery was detected the matter was reported to the authorities and "Swansea" lit a rag for parts unknown. All night the officers hunted for the fugitive without success. On Sunday, however, Deputy Sheriff Miller captured the little negro aboard a train in Columbia bound for Statesville, N. C. He had spent all of the money except \$3.00.

"Swansea" has been in the toils before. Several years ago he entered the postoffice at Swansea and helped himself to a lot of stamps. For this crime he served a term in Sing Sing. Completing his sentence he returned to Swansea, where he again got into trouble, this time stealing goods from a store. He was tried for this offense and sentenced to the chaingang.

Lexington Corn Show.

The second corn show of this county, under the auspices of the Lexington Corn Growers' association was a big success. While this movement is still in its incipiency, the character of exhibits and the enthusiasm of those present portend a larger success for the future. This association comes as the result of a lively interest in the raising of better corn which culminated last year in the first corn show this county has ever had and which was due to the untiring efforts of Congressman Lever. Since the association has been organized a lively spirit of competition has seized upon the farmers of the county, with a large increase in the yield per acre, and has back of it the almost unanimous co-operation of the farmers of the county. The department of agriculture has shown much interest in the work and from time to time various of its field men have been on the Lexington farms and it has always stood ready to lend any assistance of which it is capable. Mr. Lever is justly very proud of his venture along this line and the hearty co-operation with which the movement has met, attests the interest of the agriculturists of the county.

The show recently held was in many respects superior to that of last year—not that the enthusiasm last year was insufficient, but the care shown in the selection of the corn shown, as well as the marked improvement in the type, show that the lessons of last year's show have borne fruit. Messrs. Ira W. Williams and A. G. Smith of the department attended both shows in the capacity of lecturers on corn and both expressed themselves as being gratified with the exhibits.

Several prizes were offered for the largest yields and the first \$50, offered by Mr. Lever, was won by Mr. J. A. Eleazer of the fork, this gentleman producing 119 22-56 bushels on an acre. The second prize \$35, offered by Mr. W. P. Roof, was won by Mr. S. E. Lowman, also of the fork. The third prize, \$10, offered by W. W. Barra, was won by Jos. Eargle, of the 10-a.

The Boy's Corn club was also represented at the show, the prize for the largest yield per acre being won by Mr. Guy Taylor, of Gilbert, who raised 102 bushels on a acre, and the second prize by Mr. J. O'Neill Counts, of Peak, who raised 98 bushels.

The first prize for the best 10 ears exhibit in the boys' class was won by Malcolm Lowman and the second by Mr. Geo. S. Wingard.

The first prize for the best 10 ear exhibit in the men's class was won by Mr. C. F. Frick and the second by Mr. Geo. P. Lowman.

There were about 150 farmers in attendance. For the success of the show too much praise cannot be accorded G. A. Derrick and James W. Shealey, the heads of the government farm demonstration work in this county. Dr. E. C. Ridgell, president of the County Corn Growers, also deserves much credit for his untiring efforts to make the show a success.
