In accordance with the law in reference to the assessment and taxation of real and personal property, the Auditor, or his assistant, will be and attend the following named places for the purpose of receiving tax returns for the fiscal year 1911, and in order to meet the next appointment, the hour will close at 11 o'clook in the morning and at 4 o'clock in the afternoon. Taxpayers will, therefore, be prompt in meeting the appointments, so as not to cause delay.


