**Some Fine Corn.**

The finest specimen of corn we have seen this season was brought to this office on Saturday by Dr. Blue Mountain Joe Harman. The stalk was 15 feet high and bore three large ears. Dr. Joe says that he has two acres that will average as good as the stalk brought to town; and an additional two acres, not quite as tall but just as well cared.

The corn grew on Dr. Joe's sand hill place along the waters of North Edisto river, and has never been fertilized. The corn, Dr. Joe says, is of the well known "Pat" Bickley variety—the kind that grows so tall that "Pat" has to climb a step-ladder in order to reach the ears. Of course "Pat's" grew on Broad river, while Dr. Joe's grew in the sand hills, which is but another evidence that the sand hill farmer of today is making the farmers of the other sections sit up and take notice.
