DISMEMBERMENT OF LEXINGTON

The Proposition Not Favorably En-
tained by the People of Chapin.
Special to the State.

Newberry, October 26.—A party of
Newberrians went down to Chapin yester-
day in autos to talk with citizens
there about the proposed addition of
that portion of Lexington county to
Newberry. In the party were Fred H.
Dominick, H. L. Parr, John M. Kinard,
Cannon G. Blease, Eugene S. Warts, W.
E. Waldrop, C. E. Summer, of Newberry
and Dr. C. T. Wyche, of Prosperity.
Forty or fifty of the citizens met with
the Newberry party in the school
building. Wm. M. Wilson, of Peak,
was chairman of the meeting and Mr.
Frick was secretary. The Newberry
delegation assured the meeting that
they would be delighted to welcome
the people of Chapin into the county
and thought it would be a matter of
mutual benefit if they should come in.
The Chapin men had very little to say
in the meeting. Charles P. Robinson
made a short talk, in which he said
that he had not thought much about
the matter and had not made up his
mind about it and did not know how
he would vote were the proposition
submitted. That appeared to express
pretty correctly the feeling in Chapin.
On motion the chairman was author-
ized to appoint a committee of five to
canvass the situation and ascertain
the feeling of the territory proposed
to be cut off into Newberry and to as-
certain as far as practicable the wishes
of the people interested; this commit-
tee to be appointed at the leisure of the
chairman and to make report to a sub-
sequent meeting. The committee will
ascertain as far as it can what propo-
sition of the people wish to remain with
Lexington, what portion wish to be-
come a part of Richland and what por-
tion wish to come into Newberry.
There has been talk sometime among
the people of Peak and the people of
the adjacent country of asking for an
election on the question of voting that
portion Lexington into Newberry, and
the sentiment there is said to be strong-
ly in favor of the change, the main
question now being is how to run the
line westward from Broad river to-
wards Saluda.

Another county scheme is interest-
ing the people here. The people of
Clinton are very aggressive and earn-
estly pushing their scheme of the pro-
posed new county of Munsgrrove, with
Clinton as the capital. To get the nec-
essary 400 square miles, they will
have to cut pretty deep into Newberry
county. They have already made sur-
vey of a line from Enoree river to Sa-
luda—a straight line about 30 miles
long, cutting off a strip of Newberry
about three miles wide, including in
this strip Whitmore, Kinards, Belfast,
Dominicks, Garys, Longshore, Vau-
ghanville and so on. Under the State
Constitution, not more than 94 square
miles can be taken from Newberry as
it now stands, and the Clintonians
seem disposed to "take all the law
allows." Newberry's present area is 524
square miles and the county can be reduced
to 430. Of course Newberry
does not wish to lose any portion of
the county and would be especially
sorry to lose such a fine part as that
situated in the Munsgrrove
survey.

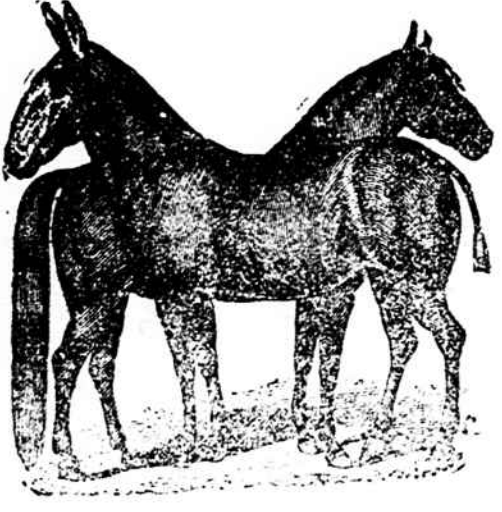
