

E. S J. Hayess died at his home neas Gilbert, S. U., September 19th, 1912. in the 65th year of his age, after s-veral month's itlness. In his death the community loses one of its best citizens and the county a loyal aud patriotic son. He possessed many noble traits of character, which commanded the respect of all with whom he had intercourse He served as a member of the County Registration Board up until the first of April of this year. At the beginning of the war between the States he enlisted and served with distinguished gallantry until the close in 1865 As a solaier he was not known to shick duty, no truer or braver soldier ever shouldered a musket or wore a grey jacket than E. S. J. Hayes. During the exposure in service he contracted rheumatism from which he suffered until death. The immediate cause of his death was paralysis. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Julia A, two daughters, Misses Pinkey and Carrie and one son, Ioor. The funeral services were conducted at St. Matthews by R-v. N. N. Burton, assisted by the R vs. Joab Edwards and C. S Felder, Ealy in life he connected him-elf with the Baptist church and died a consistent member of the same. Loving and tender hands covered his grave with beautiful flowers as a token of kindness to one who has crossed the river from whose bourne no travellei ever returns

Mrs Livy Ann, wife of Jacob Bouknight, was borr Jone 12, 1868, and died September 29, 1912, making her earthly sojourn 44 years, 2 months and 17 days. She was married to Mr Bonknight in 1882. Still an additional 5 per cent. panalty will be added on March 1st., making 7 per cent. penalty to be paid by those who

have not paid by March 1st, 1913. Tax Books will close March, 15, 1913. When remitting give each township or school district your property is in. Give one name in full, not initials.
