### Hon. T. C. Thompson to Deliver Address.

Columbia, Dec. 21.—(Special)—Of interest to all South Carolinians will be the announcement that Hon. T. C. Thompson, mayor of Chattanooga, will deliver an address at the Fifth National Corn Exposition here next month. Mr. Thompson has accepted an invitation to speak on South Carolina Day, which has been set for Jan. 28, the second day of the Exposition.

Mr. Thompson is a distinguished South Carolinian. He is a son of the late Governor Hugh S. Thompson, and for a number of years made his home in Columbia. He has many warm personal friends in this city and other sections of the State.

South Carolina Day will be a feature of the National Corn Exposition of especial interest and significance for all citizens of the Palmetto State. A special program of attractive events is being arranged, and the commercial organizations of a number of cities of the State have assured their cooperation in making the day representative of the various sections of the State. A novel parade, in which the various cities will be represented, will be one of the features of the day.

### Social Club Closed.

Carrying out the instructions of Governor Cole L. Blease, to root out blind tigers wherever they exist in this county, Sheriff Sim J. Miller is making a vigorous campaign against the illicit dealers in intoxicating drinks in every section of the county. Monday, assisted by Chief of Police Pete L. Redmond, of Swansea, the Sheriff made five arrests in that town, closing up the People's Social Club of Swansea, and arresting C. O. Gantt, manager. Gantt was immediately tried before Mayor Sam J. Derrick and was fined \$30 for selling whiskey. In the raid a lot of beer and whiskey were seized by the officers.

Joe Boyles, a negro, who operates a pressing club in Swansea, was fined \$40 by the mayor for transporting whiskey from the People's Social Club to outside parties. Boyles is said to have delivered whiskey from the club to another party, and the distance it was carried was only short, but Mayor Derrick made the fine a heavy one, as an example to others.

Three other negroes were arrested for selling whiskey on the streets, and each was fined \$10 by the Mayor. Sheriff Miller said today that he expected to put a halt to the blind tigers, and to this end he is lending his services to the mayors of the several towns wherever they are needed.

### Competitive Examination.

There will be held in the city of Columbia on Saturday, January 11, 1913, under the supervision of Prof. E. S. Dreher, beginning at 10:30 a. m., a competitive examination from which one applicant will be selected for designation to take the entrance examination at Annapolis to fill a vacancy from the Seventh Congressional District. Any bona fide resident of the Seventh Congressional District, between the age of sixteen and twenty year, and who is physically sound is eligible to take this competitive examination. I would suggest that all applicants write me for fuller particulars and permission to take this competitive examination, addressing me at the House of Representatives, Washington, D. C.
