THE BARNEY EVANS CASE

Must Show Cause Why He Should Not Be Disbarred.

Columbia, Jan. 15.—Following the information furnished by Attorney General Lyon the supreme court of South Carolina issued the following order yesterday:

"It is considered by the court that the public interests require investigation of the charges against Barnard B. Evans, an attorney, presented in an information filed by J. Fraser Lyon, attorney general, on the 6th day of January, 1912.

"Therefore it is ordered: That Barnard B. Evans do show cause before this court on the 3rd of February, 1913, at 10 o'clock a. m., why he should not be disbarred on account of the matters alleged against him in the information and that he file a copy of his return in the office of the clerk of this court on or before January 29, 1913.

"Order further: That the sheriff of Richland county do forthwith serve a certified copy of the information and a copy of this order on Barnard B. Evans.

"Ordered further: That evidence and argument to support information and return be heard on February 1, next, in the open court."

AN UNSUCCESSFUL FARMER.

He Made Money But It Did Not Do Him Much Good.

The Progressive Farmer says that it once had a letter from our friend, Capt J. O. Stribbling, of South Carolina, in which he told us about a money-making farmer he knew. This farmer had accumulated more than \$100,000 and he had made it all farming and saving what he made from the farm.

The man had not done better farming than other farmers about him, but he saved everything he made. A "good friend to me and others," Capt. Stribbling described him, "but an enemy to himself and family." Not that he was a bad man, but merely what we sometimes call a "close" man. His children received but little education and saw but little of the world. Other farmers in the neighborhood contributed to the building of churches and school houses, this man loaned money to contribute. Others spent money for new seeds, improved implements and better stock; this man did not; he saved his money and when misfortune came to others he still gathered in the interest on his loans and kept that, too.

A money-making farmer he was, but he was not a successful farmer, for the simple reason that he neglected the essentials of life in his eagerness to gather more money. Such farmers would never build up a community or promote the prosperity and welfare of a State. Capt. Stribbling in his letter well described the kind of men who must be depended on to do these things—men who improve their land and premises; breed and use good stock; look out for improved seeds, implements and methods; who send their sons and daughters to college or training schools; who farm with their own money, and who believe in plain living and high thinking.

A man can be successful without making a great deal of money; he can make a great deal of money without being successful. So we beg to remind every reader that, desirable as it is that he make money out of his farming the coming year, it is even more desirable that he devote the money he makes to such use as will benefit his family and his community, and that he keep always in mind the fact that money is a good thing only so far as it is used for good purposes.

TAX RETURNS.

In accordance with the law in reference to the assessment and taxation of real and personal property, the auditor or his assistant, will be and attend the following named places for the purpose of receiving tax returns for the fiscal year 1913. Tax payers will therefore, be prompt in meeting the appointments.

Taxpayers will please come prepared to give the name of the township and number of the district wherein they reside, also all personal property with value for taxation.

Tax returns sent in by mail are not legal unless sworn to before an officer qualified to administer oaths.

All male persons are subject to poll tax from 21 to 60 years of age, except those exempt by law.

All male persons are subject to road tax from 21 to 55 years except those residing in incorporated town or cities.

All dogs are subject to capitation tax of 50c and must be returned at the same time when other property is returned.

On January 1st, 1913, 1 per cent.

penalty will be added to those who have not paid. On February 1st, 1913, an additional 1 per cent. will be added to those who have not paid, making 2 per cent. penalty for February. Still an additional 5 per cent. penalty will be added on March 1st, making 7 per cent. penalty to be paid by those who have not paid by March 1st, 1913.

Tax Books will close March 15, 1913.

When remitting give each township or school district your property is in. Give one name in full, not initials.
