Kills Herself and Husband.
Tampa, Fla., July 26.—First trying him securely in bed as he lay asleep, Mrs. Avglina Rodriguez, a comely young Cuban woman, shot her husband to death at their home in the eastern part of the city this morning. When she saw his life had fled she cut the bonds from his body and, stretching herself beside him, fired the remaining shot from the pistol into her own heart and was dead when neighbors rushed into the house. The pair lay side by side and the slender ropes which still partly held Rodriguez's body to the bed and the pistol grasped in Mrs. Rodriguez's hand told the story. Mrs. Rodriguez did not leave any note explaining the tragedy. Evidence gathered by the police indicates that the couple had frequent quarrels.
