S. C. University Notes

Columbia, S. C., May 10.—The representative of the University of South Carolina won first place in the annual State Intercollegiate Oratorical Contest held in Rock Hill last Friday night. The University also won first place in this same contest in 1913, the winner in that instance being M. A. Wright.

The University won second place in the Georgia-Tennessee-Carolina triangular debate held last Saturday night. The query was for government ownership and operation of all railroads doing interstate business. J. S. McInnes and J. S. Dudley, of Carolina, won against the University of Georgia, debating the negative side of the query. Raymond Schwartz and Ashley Merrimon, debating the affirmative for Carolina, lost to Tennessee.

A. E. Merrimon represented the Carolina "dry men" in the prohibition oratorical contest held at Spartanburg this week. Merrimon was accompanied by a number of delegates from the "Flying Squadron."

O. F. Crow won first place in the annual intra-society oratorical contest of the Chi Phi Society last Monday evening. Second place went to J. A. Tolbert.

The University's year book, "Garnet and Black," has been in the hands of the publishers for sometime now and will be issued from the press sometime during the next fortnight.

Carolina's 1914-1915 session is drawing rapidly to a close, and preparations are being made on the commencement program. Final examinations will be held the last week in this month; seniors have their examinations one week earlier.

The Euphrasian and Chi Phi literary societies will hold their annual debating and declaiming contests next Monday evening in their respective halls.

Veteran Dead.

Greenville, May 6.—Dr. Hugh R. Rutledge, aged 92 years, a veteran of the Mexican war and a descendant of some of the most famous men South Carolina has ever produced, died here this morning shortly before 5 o'clock. Dr. Rutledge had been ill two days with pneumonia.

Rudolph H. Snelgrove.

The remains of Rudolph H. Snelgrove, who died a week ago today in Mesa, Arizona, were laid to rest in St. Stephen's cemetery, this town. Monday morning in the presence of a large gathering of friends and relatives. Brief funeral services were conducted from the church, the Rev. L. A. Thomas, pastor of St. Stephen's, officiating. The funeral offerings were many, paying a last silent tribute to the memory of the deceased.

Mr. Snelgrove several years ago left Lexington in the hope of regaining his health, settling in the State of Arizona, where he held a number of responsible positions until finally giving up to the disease which ended his career on Tuesday a week ago.

Rudolph Snelgrove was only 32 years of age. He was among the brightest of the bright, and made friends readily. His death in Lexington, where he spent his boyhood days is deeply deplored.

The deceased is survived by his father, "Kit" Snelgrove who, it is supposed, now resides in North Carolina, and who on account of the fact that his residence is unknown to friends here, has not learned of his son's death. His mother died several years ago.
