REPRESENTATION.—It is with great regret we learn that in some portions of the State, the idea seems to have gained ground that the sudden close of the war, with the great changes consequent thereon, is to act as a sort of virtual bankruptcy act in the wiping away of all private debts. Candidates, too, we understand, are introducing themselves upon the Convention, they will pledge—that is, to come bodily up to the question—advocate, and vote for some measure of repudiation of this nature. Now, this is all wrong, and not only morally evil, but constitutionally and legally impossible. The Constitution of the United States prohibits any State from passing laws impairing the obligation of contracts, and even a State Convention—which possesses so much broader a jurisdiction than the legislative—cannot be incompetent to the enactment of any such legislation. That quasi-republican, known as an extension of the stay laws, is in effect such an impairing, and if brought before the Supreme Court, as it would inevitably be, would be declared null and void. The only way to meet this matter is in the manner pointed out in some remarks of our correspondent "Common Sense," whose communication appeared in yesterday's issue—to come bodily up to the question—recognize the indefeasible claim of creditors to their *cheque in action*, and endeavor to satisfy those just claims either in full, if possible, or by the best compromise practicable. The fair dealing of many of our merchants in settling ante-war accounts with Northern creditors, has reflected much lustre on the integrity of the Southern business public, and it would be a crying shame if, in an effort to make a simoniacally safe, to repudiate just demands, a stigma were to be affixed upon our people. Seven cases out of ten, fair compromises can be made, or time can be obtained wherein to pay in full, and it would be far better to attempt this course than to essay a repudiation that can only end in financial ruin and personal disgrace.
