THE FREEDMEN'S BUREAU.—The Bill before Congress relating to the Freedman's Bureau provides that the Act establishing the Bureau shall continue in force until otherwise provided by law, and shall extend to refugees and freedmen in all parts of the United States. It provides for the division of the Districts and authorizes the Secretary of War to issue fuel, clothing, etc., to refugees and freedmen, and authorizes the President to reserve for sale, or from settlement under the Homestead or Pre-emption laws, and to set apart for the use of freedmen and loyal refugees unoccupied lands in Florida, Mississippi and Arkansas, not exceeding in all three millions of acres of good land. Section fifth confirms the possessors, titles granted by order of dajor General Sherman, and the remaining sections relate to the duties of the Commiss oners, the military protection to be extended to the freedmen and the punishment for subjecting freedmen to slavery .- Courier.


