By the terms of the Act of Congress en d "An Act to previde for the more efent government of the sebel States," March 23d, and July 19th, 1867, supplementary thereto, it is made the duty of the Commanding General of this Military District to cause a registration to be made of the male inhabitants of the State of South Carolina, of the age of twenty-one years and apwards, and qualified by the terms of said Acts to vote, and after such registration is complete to order an election to be held, at which the registered voters of said State shall vote for or against a Convention, for the purpose of establishing a Constitution and civil government for the said State, loyal to the Union, and for delegates to said convention, and to give at least thirty days' solve of the time and place at which said dection shall be held; and the said registration having been completed in the State of South Carolina, it is ordered:

First. That an election he held in the State of South Carolina, commencing on TUESDAY, the 19th day of November, 1867, and ending on WEDNESDAY, the 20th day of November, 1867, at which all registered voters of said State may vote "For a Convention," or "Ag instation vention," and for delegates to constitute the Convention—in case a majority of the votes given on that question shall be lor a Con-vention, and in case a majority of the registered voters shall have voted on the ques-

tention, and in case a majority of she registered voters shall have voted on the question of holding such Convention

Second. It shall be the duty of the Boards of Registration in South Carolina, commencing fourteen days prior to the election herein ordered, and giving reasonable public notice of the time and place thereof, to reuse for a period of five days the registration lists, and upon being satisfied that any person not entitled thereto has been registered, to strike the name of such person from the list; and such person shall not be entitled to vote. The Buards of Registration shall also, during the same period, add to such registers the minres of all persons who, at that time possess the qualifications required by said Acts—who have not already been registered.

Third, in deciding who are to be stricken from or added to the registration lists, the Boards will be guided by the law of March 2d, 1897, and the laws supplementary thereto, and their attention is specially directed to the supplementary Act of July 19th, 1887.
