PREAMBLE AND RESOLUTIONS Of the Board of Newberry College, as to the

Scholarships of said College. WHEREAS Newberry College has reached a period in its history, in which the Board of Trustees is compelled either to suspend the exercises of the Institution indefinitely, and to sell the property at public auction, or to make a compromise with the holders of Scholarships, and

WHEREAS, Scholarship holders have been notified by circular of the necessity of immediately remitting their dues that the exercises of College may continue, and they have failed to respond, and

WHEREAS, The necessity of such action has been occasioned, not from any want on the part of the Beard of Trustees to comply with its obligations; but from the noncompliance of the Scholarship holders to fulfil the obligations prouved si in their bonds, and

WHEREAS, The necessity cither to sus pend, and to sell, or to compromise forces itself upon the . oard at the present time, therefore,

RESOLVED, By the Board of Trustees as embled, and in accordance with the recommendation of the Ev. Luth. Synod of So. Ca. and adjacent States, whose servants they are, holding in trust the College of

1. Every Scholarship paid in good mo-ney or its equivalent, before or during the war, shall be charged only half the price of tuition for every collegiate year due; or if paid in Confederate money after Jan. 1st, 1863, three fourths the amount of tuition, until the said scholarship is fully expended.

2. All scholarships, whose dues have not been paid in full, to Jan. 1st, 1868, shall be considered null and void, and will be regarded by the Board, after said date, as

3. Scholarship holders, wishing to avail themselves of the benefit of their scholar ships forfeited as in Res. 2, can do so by paying the balance due on their scholar-ships, on or before the first of Jan'y, 1869, and secure the benefit of Res. 1. Nothing owever, herein contained shall entitle the cholarship holder to send on such scholar-

scholarship noncer to send on such scholar-ship until all arrearages are paid.

4 After Jan. 1st, 1868, Newberry Col-lege shall be self sustaining, and overy stu-dent shall be charged monthly, and no ore shall be permitted to continue, until his monthly arrearages are paid, or settlement

5. All Beneficiaries of the Luth, Church, as the College is an Institution of the Church, shall be entitled to tuition free, unless otherwise ordered by Synod.

6. No Scholarship shall be sold after the date of this meeting of the Board of Trus-

7. All back dues shall be placed into the hands of a collector to be appointed, and he shall be authorized to proceed in the collection of these dues, according to his judgment, and the amount collected shall be applied to liquidating the back salaries

Another friend of ours, in another part of the Fork, with 3 plow hands and 3 hoe hands, all white, made 500 pounds Indigo, 2 bales Cotton, 550 bushels Corn, 150 bushels Peas, 50 bushels Rice, 300 gallons Syrup, ran a Grist Mill for the benefit of himself and neighbors, made Pinders and Potatoes in abundance, realized one hundred dollars from the sale of Watermelons, all on lands counted poor. We like this system of Agriculture; our people must no longer trust to making money out of one leading staple; they must pay their attention to diversity of crops, and make each contribute its quota to the profits of the year. This is the only system of planting that will pay in these days on our average lands.


