DESCRIPTION OF THE SERPENT KIL-EED AT EASTPORT MAINE.

The strange animal killed near Eastport Maine, has been on exhibition in that city during the past two weeks:

This animal, part fish and part beast, is over thirty feet long in length, and girts twenty-one feet. It has one enormous dorsal fin, two side belly fins, and a broad, shark like tail. About one-third of its length from its tail, in connection with small fins, it has two huge legs terminating in webb feet. Its mouth makes a line of five or six feet in length, the whole extent of which is set with innumerable small teeth very much resembling in size and shape the kernel of a species of sharppointed pop-corn. It bas a series of gills which overlap each other like the flounces once the style of ladies'dresses. His immense body, which was estimated to have weighed when captured about eleven tons, has no frame work of bones, its most solid portions consisting of cartilage incapable of preservation. Its skin is dark and tough, like that of the elephant and rhinoceros. There is no record of his species, and to none is it a greater wonder than to nataralists whose attention is being drawn to it. Among others whe have had an opportunity of seeing it, is Professor Baird, of the Smithsonian Institute of Washington, who is yet unable to place it in the known list of the animal kingdom. When first discovered it was swimming along leisurely, and when pursued took to the land, and when captured was a hundred and twenty feet above high water mark. Numerous shots were fired at it, but none took effect until the gun was loaded with small spikes, which took effect, striking just above the main fore fin. On analyzing the stomach, it contained nothing but vegetable matter, which lead to the conclusion that it subsisted upon vegetables on the bottom, of the ocean and shore.

H. states that several individuals called at the house of Harry McDaniel, a member of the Legislature, and on his appearing, fired upon him, wounding him through the shoulder, it is reported that several colored people were taken from their houses and beaten. The writer

suggests that the K K K's, are at work. Passengers by the Greenville train state that at White Hall, in Abbeville County, the negroes took possession of the polls and fired on the whites. The fire was returned, and one negro was killed and several severely wounded-one mortally, it is thought.

WASHINGTON, November 4. A special telegram to the New York Herald says the whole Island of Cuba is in an excited state. Business is prostrated on account of the distrust and alarm of the people. The Captain General is strangely reticent. A ceputation of the leading citizens who called upon him were insulted by an officer of his household, and the leaders ordered to Spain. A telegram from the American Consul. asking that a few United States war vessels be sent there was refused transmission over the wires. The insurgents are six thousand strong, numbering many Spaniards. Their cry is "Spain, Prim and Serano, and down with taxation.' The troops number ten thousand, and are acknowledged insufficient to suppress the rebellion. Lersundi, it is said, has received ample instructions from Provisional Government." The news by the Cadiz steamer is anxiously expected.

London, Novemeer 6 .- The Times, in discussing the election, bolds that though the Democrats are beaten and have a majority against them in Congress, yet they are a powerful party and must greatly influence the policy of the Government.
