DENTAT OF AGRICULTURIL STATISTICS. COLUXBIA, June 15, 1889. THE attention of the citizens of the Stat-is respectful y minied to the annex d extracts from an Act passed at the recent section of the General Assembly, and rati-fied on the 19th day of March, 1869; and their cordial co-operation with the officers charged with the execution of the law is earnestly requested.

The enumeration of the inhabitants is to farmish a basis for the apportionment of representation in the next General Assembly in accordance with Section 4 of Article II of the Constitution, and the necessity for its correctness will commend itself to citizens of all political viewa.

In co: nection with this work the statis tics of the agrice tutal productions of last year will be taken, and it is eminently desirable that they should be returned as fullwand intelligibly as circumstances will permit, as it is expected that they will furnish valuable data in the future agricultural history of the State.

Section & That it shall be the duty of each at devery person appointed to take the census by virtue of this Act to call personally on the head or so as member of each family in the County, or portion of County, for which he or they shall have been appointed, and obtain from such head ot's family or member thereof, as aforesaid, the number of persons contained in such family, and such other information as may be required and directed by the Commissionier of the Bureau of Agricultural Statisties.

Sac. 4. 




