he is sure he can do as others do. 2. A great many unsuccessful farmers get in the grass, and fail to keep up with their work, but you will hardly ever find one that has not an excuse. It was too wet or too dry, or the hands fail ed to work, or something prevented the work being done in the proper way and at the proper time; when the real cause was bad management. And the reason why they don't learn to manage Lime, Coment, Plaster, Paints, Cils, French better is, they don't attribute the results to their true cause. If they would say I failed, instead of the seasons, etc, they might learn

to mana_e better. 3. A armer should know what his means will admit of his doing -how many hands, mules, etc., it will take to do the work he proposes to have done in a certain time. This perhaps requires the nicest of all calculations, and as man by nature wants to do more than he can do, it would be well for him to guard against laying off more work than he is able to do. The only rule that I can give that will be sure to guard him against this great error, is to calculate what he will do this year by what he did last.

4. A great many good men, and | Paints, especially farmers, are careless or indolent. They are always cheerful and accommodating, and proposing to do a great deal next year, but wait until it is too late to begin. The way to avoid this, is to commence at once, and never stop. If you are waiting for to morrow or next week, before you go to work, you may know you belong to this class of good fellows.

5. The farmers who make more than they consume, generally know what their land; will produce-what their means will admit of their doing-lay off no more work than they can have done, and adopt a rule, for cultivation that they are able to carry out. If these things mark a man's success in business, the young man would do well to heed them. 6. To know how to do is indis-

pensably necessary. This may be acquired by seeing others do, or by reading how they do. It is equally necessary to know what one knows and what he can do .-Let us consider how we may learn this. Did your business last year turn out what you expected it would? If it did not, acknowledge the fault as yours, and not knowing what to expect, etc. Did you carry out your plan? If not, more than likely the fault was yours, and you would generally do well to so consider it. Did you do all the work you proposed? It you did not, acknowledge that it was your fault not knowing what to expect of yourself. By such procedure you may learn yourself by the same rule that others know you by, which is: What you will do and know, by what you have done and known - Southern Culti-

Money in Eggs. - Eggs are in active demand at a good price. They are wanted for home consomition and for shipment, both East West. Eggs have command-· ed a good price during all the recent period that corn, wheat and outs have been so very low.

Ever since the war the production of eggs has been a paying business, and the wonder is that more farmers do not give attention to this profitable branch of husbandry. Rail ads have benefitted the business of producing eggs, as they can be sent at a com paratively small cost to the sea- FOR GOOD WORK. board on either ocean, where there is always a good demand for them at good prices.

The improved egg carriers, that have been brought out during the past few years, have rendered the transportation of eggs comparatively safe, and have done much to REPAIRING AND PAINTING A help the trade in this important article of food. But for all that eggs are high and grains and meat are low, less attention is given to the production of the former than in the old times when they were worth but a fourth what they are now. Almost everywhere country merchants complain of the falling off in the supply of eggs from their patrons. [Prairie Farmer.

+---SYRUP OF COFFEE .- This preparation is of great use to those who have long journeys to make : Take half a pound of the best ground coffee, put it into a saucepan containing three pints of water, and boil it down to one pint. Cool the liquor, put it into another GROCERIES, saucepau, well secured, and boil it again. As it boils, add white sugar enough to give it the consistency of syrup. Take it from the fire, and when it is cold, put it into a bottle, and seal. When traveling if you wish for a cap of good coffee, you have only to put two teaspoonfuls of syrap into an ordi nary coffce-pot, and fill with boiling water. Add milk to taste it you can get it.



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


