The tax has been swelling gradually for years, each gathering being heavier than the one preceding; with that experience the tax payer, growing accustomed to it, and expeing nothing else, paid up his tax with as good grace as possible, but now at one fell swoop the amount is DOUBLED, and men who had prepared themselves to pay according to the levy made by the Legislature, find to their bitter disappointment, to their consternation. that their assessments rendered in on oath, have in nearly every case been made twice as high.
