COURT.—The March term of Court commenced its session on Monday, Judge M. Moses, presiding. The usual diversity presented itself in the absence of jurors and witnesses. At this term the case of the State vs. Glover, charged with the murder of Gomillion in Edgefield, will be tried—Wednesday, we believe, being set apart for it. The case of the State vs. J. W. Kitchens, charged with the murder of Jasper Henderson, and which occurred last winter a year ago, is presumed, will also come up this Court. Kitchens was brought before the Judge on Monday. Young Kinard, colored, on the charge of larceny, plead guilty.
