WHERE IS THE MANURE TO COME FROM?

Two facts in farming are becoming, year by year, more and more evident, and every thinking farmer must necessarily accept them.

A neighbor and myself bought a ten acre field that had been badly run down by its previous owner. This field was originally a rich clay loam, and of uniform quality throughout.

My neighbor adopted a different policy. He manured, it is true, but he ploughed nothing under. He had determined to make the field pay for itself, and he continued to crop it, as had been before.

FOOD FOR HORSES.—I have found great difference of opinion with regard to feeding and the amount of food necessary for keeping animals, and I resolved to go to headquarters.
