As good a plan as any to have luck and the moon on your side in regard to corn, is to use fertilizers. A writer in the Practical Farmer says that he kept his young orchard well cultivated with hoed crops for several years. They grew eighteen inches to two feet in a season. Only one tree died. A neighbor set out an orchard at the same time and seeded it to grass. In three years one-third of the trees were dead, and those which lived grew only from two to six inches in a year. This is about the usual experience.

Harness should never be kept in the stable where manure is constantly generating large quantities of ammonia. The Commissioner of Agriculture, in his report for the year 1875, speaks as follows: "There can be no doubt of the genera adulteration of all malt liquors. In England and other countries, where heavy penulties are imposed, and an increasing vigilance practiced to detect and punish such frauds, by a system of inspection of all malt liquors manufactured before exposed to sale, the practice is very common. How much more in this country, where there are no laws on the subject, and no officer to carefully analyze the products of the brewery? years ago, Professor Mapes, of New York, analyzed the beer from a dozen different breweries, and all were found adulterated with noxious substances. It is said that the sale of drugs to brewers is a profitable part of the trade. This is perfectly infamous, Cocculus indicus, (fish-berry,) nux vomica, (dog-button, from which strychnine is obrained.) are some of the delectabe substances found in beer! These are potent poisons, and the brewer found using them should be drowned at once in one of his own vats. The British Parliament passed a law to prevent this nefarious business. The following is an extract: 'No druggist, vender of or dealer in drugs, or chemist, or any other person, shall sell or deliver to any licensed brewer, dealer in or retailer of beer, knowing them to be such, or shall sell or deliver to any person on account of, or in trust for, any such brewer, dealer or retailer, any liquor called by the name of or sold for coloring from whatever material the same may be made; or any material or preparation other than unground brown malt, for the darkenng the color of worts beer, or any molasses,

vitriol, honey, quassia, coccolus indicus, grains of paradise, Guinea pepper, or opium, or any extract or preparation of molasses, or any article or preparation to be used in worts beer for or as a substitute for malt or hops; and if any druggist shall offend in any of these particulars, such preparation, &c., shall be orfeited, and may be seized by any officer of excise, and the person so offending shall forfeit five hundred pounds. brewers were brought to grief, and yet the practice continues. Unless the American public are ready to admit the immaculate purity and innocence of American brewers, they must be content, while drinking their beer, to cherish the belief that they are at the same time guzzling some narcotic poison or damaging medicine. In view of the unpregreat increase of the number of malsters and

brewers; of the vast unknown quantities of beer that are drunk in every city and almost every town on the continent, it is the dictate of sound wisdom that the attention of legislators should be called to the subject of the adulteration of our malt liquors, and severe penalties should be inflicted as a preventive.' 

MARCH.

[From the Southern Cultivator.]

Now the work must be pushed.

CABBAGE, LETTUCE AND CELERY plants put out. Bed your smoothest, largest sweet potatoes in cold frame or hot bed if you choose, and so have plenty of fine plants by the middle and latter part of April. Put in seeds of Tomato, Egg-plant, Pepper, in frame or Cucumber, Squash, Melon, Watermelon, so as to be ready by the latter part of the month. Of Cucumbers, the old approved sorts. "Early Frame," "Early Cluster," "Long Green" are good enough. The Green Prolific is highly praised. No better summer Squash than the golden Crookneck. In ordering squash seed put down a } pound or more of "Hubbard" or "Marblehead" to plant in June for winter use. Hills 10 x 8 and 2 or 3 vines to the hill. Of melons, Sill's Hybrid and Cassaba are excellent. Set apart a hill or two to provide seed for the next year, letting the fruit of all mature thoroughly. Okra; sow and put in seed

ribbed sorts.
