Cotton Burned.

While the down freight train of the G. & C. R. R., loaded with cotton, was standing at the Newberry Depot Saturday, a spark from the engine set fire to the cotton. The fire spread like a flash from barge to barge. The engine at the time was engaged in switching boxes from one track to another. As soon as possible the two flats containing the burning cotton were run up to Scott's Creek, a hundred yards distant, and rolled down the embankment into the creek. Eighty bales were burned; fifteen or twenty completely destroyed and the remainder so destroyed as to render them almost worthless. Superintendent Dodamead, being immediately informed, telegraphed all the hands of the Helena shops to come down and save what they could; they were engaged till late Saturday night putting out the fire, and have since saved a large portion of the cotton in a damaged state. The cotton had been shipped from Donaldville, and was on its way to Charleston. The saved portions are now being repacked by Mr. W. T. Fair. The loss is about \$1,200.
