He also stood by the Bond Court when an effort was made to repeal it, and the decision of that Court demonstrated the wisdom of his position, for they decided in favor of the "Bond Committee's report," thus saving the State millions. This gives us a good excuse for not paying those bonds, for a State can never be sued; but South Carolina waived this right; went into Court as a private citizen and took her chances, proved conclusively that the Bonds were fraudulent and ought not to be paid-and got a decree in her favor. Mr. Johnstone had voted to establish this Court at the last session, and advocated earnestly the continuance of it. The Phonograph.

Mr. W. C. Chapman and brother exhibited one of Edison's phonographs in Thespian Hall for two days and nights last week. The name denotes the character of the instrument. It comes from two Greek words-phonos, sound, and graphein, to write. It

does, literally, write sounds. The instrument is rather difficult of explanation to one who has never seen t: but it is one of the simplest pieces of machinery imaginable, and is based on one of the simplest laws of natural philosophy. All sound is caused by vibrations of the air. You strike a bell the bell vibrates, putting the air (or atmosphere) in motion; the air strikes against the tympanum, or drum, of the ear, and the result is-sound. You pass a rough bow across a fiddle string: he string vibrates, or is set in motionair from your lungs through the larynx; sound is produced, and the teeth, tongue and lips shape that sound into words. To apply this law to the phonograph: The phonograph has a cylindrical drum over which a sheet of tin foil is tightly siretched. The other part of the instrument is the mouth piece of mica, or singlass, through which passes a needle, the point of the needle barely touching the tin foil already mentioned. tached to the mica is a mouth piece. 
