New Book.
A VOICE FROM SOUTH CAROLINA. Twelve Chapters from Hampton; two Chapters after Hampton; with the Journal of a Reputed Ku-Klux. By John A. Land, Ph. D. Charleston: Walker, Evans & Cogswell. This book, intense now, will have an augmented value as the years go on. When the philosophical historian shall write the annals of our great Confederate struggle, and the strange anomaly of "Reconstruction" which followed it, a contemporary serial like this will be indispensable material. No one who reads the recent histories which surpass fiction in their hold upon human attention can have failed to note with surprise the edginess of character and motive and the feeling which pervades every line of the volume before us has all the elements which can give it value to this end. The author describes events of which he was part, and the feeling exhibited in his words, far from being evidence of want of liberality and impartiality, is a mark of his sincerity and integrity. A calm, judicial tone would have more effect upon those outside of the South who desire to get at facts, but Southern writers can do this only by writing in the Reconstruction period, and Major Land calls a "pade a spade wherever he finds it." There are some slight errors of fact, and a few of the chapters are not so well written as the rest of the book is considered. It is important for the future as it is interesting in the present. As the only record in print of the personal and practical operation of the infamous Ku-Klux legislation it should be read by every one who would prize the liberties which have been regained, and gauds and straggle Hampton) are a graphic picture of Carpet-Bag Rule in Carolina, and the two Chapters which follow set forth the Provisional Reconstruction under its renewed and beloved Governor. The appendix contains a full resume of the frauds by which the Commonwealth was despoiled, and all but destroyed.
