AN ORDINANCE To Raise Supplies for the Town of Newberry. S. C., for the Year of Our Lord One Thousand Eight Hundred and Eighty; and for Other Purposes Therein Men-

SHOES

SECTION I. Be it ordained by the Town Council and by the authority of the same, That all Real Estate owned or possessed within the corporate limits of the Town of Newberry, S. C., shall be subject to a taxation in the manner and at the rate and conformably to the provisions hereinafter specified: regard being had to the real value of the same, viz: Every building, lot, or other real estate, except such lands as are used exclusively for agricultural purposes, shall be, and are hereby, made liable to a tax of twenty cents on every hundred dol-

lars of the assessed value thereof. SEC. II. And be it further ordained, by the authority aforesaid, That a tax of onefifth of one per centum shall be levied on the ad valorem value of all merchandise and all other personal property on hand on the first day of May, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty; provided, however, that the tax in this Section provided, shall not be levied on pleasure carriages, barouches, buggies, omnibuses, drays, carts and wagons used for hire or public employment within the corporate

SEC. III. And be it further ordained, by the authority aforesaid, That a tax of two collars shall be levied upon each pleasure ca riage, barouche, buggy, omnibus, dray ment within the corporate limits on or after the first day of May, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty.
SEC. IV. And be it further ordained,

That the taxes levied under Sections one, two, and three of this Ordinance shall, and they are hereby, declared payable from the first day of May, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty, to the thirty-first day of May, inclusive, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty. And that in case of the failure of any person to comply with the provisions of this Ordinance on or before the thirty-first day of May, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty, the pains and penalties by law attaching to such a failure shall be strictly enforced.

The Republican Convention of Newberry County met in the Court House Saturday, 17th, to elect delegates to the State Convention, which meets in Columbia the 28th instant. There were eighty-seven delegates present; every Township was fully represented except Nos. 3 and 4-these sent no delegates. There were no contested seats. Henry Kennedy, County Chairman, called the Convention to order. An organization was effected by the election of Simeon Young, President, and B. W. Nance and H. E. Lewis, Secretaries. Young, on taking the chair, said: I feel grateful to you for the compliment you have paid me. Looking over this body it makes me think of old days-the good

The Committee on Rules and Regulations reported, restricting each delegate to five minutes and to only two speeches

David R. Phifer was the only white delegate in the Convention, the lingering reminder and representative of that class who after the war turned their backs upon their race and played traitor to the State-a solitary scallawag-"the last rose of summer left blooming alone.' While the committees were out he was called on to address the Convention. very much to his surprise-of course. He said: I am greatly surprised at being called on to make a speech to-day. don't know whether to talk about the crops, or the weather, or what; suppose it is intended that I should say something about politics. This is an important question. I am glad to see the Republican party of Newberry County quietly and firmly represented in Convention, and to see the spirit that animates this body.
