Prof. David Duncan, of Spartanburg, died Moaday, the 31st ultimo, after an illness of only a few days, at the age of ninety-one years. Prof. Duncan was born in County Donegal, Ireland, and graduated at the Glasgow University, Scotland. He served for three years in the English Navy as a Midshipman. In 1816 he came to this country and settled at Norfolk, Va., where he taught a classical school until the opening of Randolph-Macon College, in 1837, when be was elected Professor of Ancient Literature in that institution. When Woford College was opened at Spartanburg in 1854, he was made Professor of Aucient Literature, and filled this position till a year or two ago when failing health necessitated his ceasing from ac-

A sale of \$500,000 was made on account of one of the banks at \$10 and \$12. The total sales in Charleston vesterday were about \$600,000. A rip ple of excitement was caused by an advertisement for Confederate notes, but the boom in these was not very extensive, it being understood that they were wanted for the purpose of circulating them with an advertisement on the back. A small amount of notes were sold at 25 cents per \$1,000.

Some bullish holders of Confederate bonds were talking vesterday of getting \$25 and \$30 a thousand for their precious rubbish; but telegrams from New York received in the afternoon reported a break in the market, the bonds being freely offered there at \$7.50.
