The exhibit of cattle at the International Cotton Exposition now in progress at Atlanta, Ga., has seldom been surpassed in the quality of the exhibit as a whole, or in the excellence of the individual animals which took some of the prizes

The Short Horn herds exhibited by Messrs. J. R. Anderson, of Anderson's, Ohio, and Geo. W. Palmer, of Saltville, Virginia, were superb. The head of Mr. Anderson's herd weighed 2,670 pounds, and that of Mr. Palmer's herd, a animal, weighed 2,000 pounds. The objects had prominently in view in the breeding of the two herds were conspicuously prominent in the characteristics of the animals. Mr. Anderson's herd had been bred with an eye almost single to the production of beef, while Mr. Palmer had sought a combination of beef and milk pro. duction. We hardly think a breeder of the skill shown in the quality of Mr. Anderson's herd would prefer to breed from animals in the pampered condition of the individuals of the herd exhibited. Yet he showed that he knew how to capture the eye of the average observer, and we doubt not, attract that of the best judges. His herd does him credit as a skillful breeder of Short Horns and an experienced exhibitor, for few men can eliminate the influence of fat in their judgment of animals of any kind, even when it has nothing to do with the qualities on which they are called upon to pass. The Exposition was key. fortunate in having as judges in every class of cattle, men of experience and character, men who thoroughly understood their business. The awards were made with the best judgment and the most even-handed justice. Mr. Anderson took the prize of \$350 on his

This was exhibited in the uniformity of the type of his animals and in the full development of the characteristic points of the Devons.

Individuals in the other herds possessed particular points of excellence superior to those of Mr. Whitmore's cattle, but the tout ensemble of Mr. W.'s herd was simply superb.
